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I have never known a Bethlehem Baptist Church without Tom Steller. Of course, there was one. This great church was 109 years old before Tom or I were part of it. But within the first year of my pastoral ministry in 1980, Tom was not only part of my dream team, but also was living in the other half of our duplex where he and Julie still live, 40 years later. He remained part of the team for my entire ministry.

Having memorized the entire book of James, Tom picked up numerous beautiful traits from this letter. The one that tends to conceal the others was his obedience to the imperative, “Be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger” (James 1:19). I think one of the most important roles I played for 33 years at Bethlehem was knowing when and how, in a staff meeting, to turn to silent Tom and make him talk. Countless times, the logjam would break as Tom gave a perspective that opened a whole new way forward.

Behind his slowness to speak and slowness to anger (has anyone ever seen Tom show anger?) lay an incarnation of James 3:17, “The wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere.” Tom’s gentleness concealed a stunning heavenly wisdom. Many have seen it in personal relations. Few saw it like the staff did in institutional design. Repeatedly, in the 33 years we served together, Tom quietly redesigned the ministry structures of Bethlehem, building trellises that kept the vine fruitful in the sunlight of God’s word.

Tom was a guinea pig for at least five pastoral positions, accepting new roles to see if we really needed them. He was the first full-time pastor for college students, the first full-time pastor for world missions, the first full-time executive pastor, the first full-time pastor for leadership development, and the first ever overseer, and then dean, of what became Bethlehem College & Seminary. There would be no College and Seminary without him. Perhaps the most seminal and important obedience to James that Tom manifested beneath all the others was, “Receive with meekness the implanted word” (James 1:21). Tom received the word of God so deeply, and thought about it so profoundly, and applied it so steadily, that he became a great teacher for students, and a great counselor for me. Tom saw things in the word others didn’t see. This made him a well-spring of life and joy in my ministry.

Behind the scenes there was always the indispensable Julie. Like Tom, she was a student of mine at Bethel. I performed their marriage 43 years ago, preaching from John 16:33, “In the world you will have trouble. But be of good cheer; I have overcome the world.” Julie has been steadfast in her devotion to her husband, freeing him for his astonishing accomplishments at Bethlehem. Five children and forty years later, she is as strong and creative as ever. The ministry of Tom Steller is inconceivable without Julie.

Tom and I have talked about his transition to missions for a long time. I knew it was coming. I am thrilled that the post-65 chapter of Tom’s life will be the African chapter. Serving theological education in Africa is a beautiful combination of Tom’s gifts and passions: a superior exegete, an empowering teacher, a structural genius, a lover of missions. How good God is that we at Bethlehem get to be Tom’s senders.

Perhaps you have forgotten that Tom wrote the “Afterword” for my book, *Let the Nations Be Glad*. The title of the Afterword is “The Supremacy of God in Going and Sending.” It is an application of 3 John 1:6–7, “Send them on their journey in a manner worthy of God. For they have gone out for the sake of the name.”

Now it all comes full circle. The one who taught us how to send, and designed structures for sending, is now to be sent. What a privilege we have! Thank you, dear Lord Jesus, for blessing me, and this church for 40 years with the life and wisdom and love of Tom Steller. Make this the most fruitful chapter of his life.
